

They returned the following day to unwrap their bundles - and I was disappointed because the strong, bright colours were lacking. I offered them a return try (at no extra cost!) and Joan and Joyce have returned and thank goodness the results were positive. They both tried different patterns and the results are excellent. Joyce intertwined leaves that would return red and green and Joan used only the long thin leaves of *Eucalyptus nichollii*. I will try both their techniques in the future. Anita has yet to return and perfect her results. A good time was had by all.

Still in autumn but with winter rapidly approaching, it seems that the Correa season has suddenly hit. At our May meeting Kevin brought many specimens including a selection of beautiful Correas with a cutting grown specimen of *Correa reflexa* (below left) taken from the Dunkeld Tourist Information Centre taking first prize. The stunningly large and vibrant red flowers were beacons. Kevin didn't know if it was a species or a cultivar but thought it might have originated in the Grampians. David brought the piece home to try and harvest some cuttings. We have 3 plants that I recently planted along our driveway that were also struck from the DTIC but I'm not sure if it was the same plant. Kevin also brought a piece of *Correa reflexa* 'John Amor' (below centre). *Correa reflexa* var. *reflexa* 'John Amor' is a Portland heathland Correa collected and cultivated for the nursery trade by Lorraine Deppeler quite a few years ago. John Amor made an enormous contribution to the conservation of the flora and fauna of southwest Victoria. He passed away in 2010 and the plant was named in his honour. He was also a regular volunteer at 3WAY-FM and they had one of these Correas planted in his memory in front of the building. It has since died and they are after a new plant to replace it. David and Kevin currently have cuttings in and are hoping for success. The original plants near Portland have disappeared due to development and the encroachment of sallow wattle. Kevin also brought beautiful *Correa pulchella* 'Autumn Blaze' (below right). It's a selection from the wild on Kangaroo Island. It grows .3m x 1.5m and has glossy leaves and brilliant orange flowers with strongly recurved petal tips. It is very hardy and an annual tip prune will keep it bushy.

Ross brought a very striking *Callistemon* 'Mauve Mist'. Originally from Ewan at Codrington Nursery as tiny plants in a hiko tray, it's one of 22 others that survived from the tray of seconds. All are doing well dotted around the garden and along the front fence. They're nice rounded shrubs 2m x 1.5m with heaps of beautiful purplish flowers

Ross also brought *Acacia beckleri*. When I worked in the wholesale nursery in Pomonal my boss wanted to grow the magnificent and truly iconic *Acacia beckleri* for its bright yellow and enormous flowers. They are truly the best wattle for cut flowers with individual flowers almost as big as a Pycnosorus [up to 15mm wide]. She bought in seed and grew heaps that she sold and we planted some in Pomonal but got this wattle that Ross brought in. It's a very attractive creamy yellow and very fragrant wattle with medium sized balls so disappointing but lovely at the same time. It lasts well in a vase and isn't frost tender like the bright yellow beckleri is.

Greg brought in a very lovely flower from his *Banksia seminuda* (photo right). It was planted many years ago and is now 6m high but could possibly grow to 25m. Known as the River Banksia, it flowers in late summer to late winter with yellow but occasionally red flowers that are up to 200mm long and 70mm wide. The timber is also used for woodworking. It's a fast growing and adaptable Banksia tolerating

frosts and dry periods. Our *Banksia seminuda* up the back of our 6 acres has flowers half the size of Greg's so he has generously shared some cones with us. Hopefully we'll be able to grow some as spectacular.

Appette brought in another Correal Hoperayl Correa (Coastal Pires)

Annette brought in another Correa! Hooray! *Correa* 'Coastal Pink' is a relatively new release of *Correa alba* so should be well suited to our coastal environment. In fact the label says OzBreed's Correa 'Coastal Pink' is "a shrub that copes well with coastal winds!" Pinker than other 'pink' albas, it has a strong growth habit to 2m x 2m and is reported to be very hardy to drought, frost and most soil types. Annette found her Correa 'Coastal Pink' in Bunnings.

David brought in several specimens including *Correa lawrenciana* var. *cordifolia*. Cordifolia means heart shaped leaves and the leaves are certainly a feature. They are broad, ovate or nearly heart shaped 70mm x 40mm, smooth on top and velvety below. The flowers may be yellow or pink and have distinctive cup shaped calyxes. It can grow to 2m and is a good background plant enjoying shade or part shade. Our plant looks very striking behind the shed against the dark blue water tank. One of its cultivars is called Correa 'Christmas in July' for obvious reasons.

David also brought *Hakea* 'Stockdale Sensation' (photo left). If you can only have one Hakea then this should be the one. Initially grown by the delightful Max Ewer it is now sold by Native Plant Wholesalers in Mt Gambier. Believed to be a hybrid between *Hakea laurina* and *Hakea petiolaris* it grows 2-3m high x 2m wide, and it begins flowering in late autumn and into winter with cream pincushion flowers ageing pink to red. It has a nice weeping habit and is tolerant of many soil types and conditions.





Plant Profile by Dave Handscombe - Correa alba

Species: Correa alba

Correa: Named after the Portuguese ambassador and botanist Jose Correia de Serra.

alba: Meaning white

Common Name: White Correa.

Variants: There are three variants of Correa alba.

Correa alba var alba Correa alba var pannosa Correa alba var rotundifolia

Family: Rutaceae

Dimensions: Height: variable 1.5 metres, width 1.5 metres.

Registered cultivars on the ACRA site are Correa alba 'Blush', Correa alba "Starlight" and Correa alba 'Western Pink Star'. There are 2 Plant Breeders Rights current as accepted, Correa alba Star Showers and Correa alba Coastal Pink.

Correa alba var alba occurs from Newcastle in NSW along the east coast through to Cape Otway in Victoria. Correa alba var pannosa occurs from Victor Harbor in SA through to Port Campbell in Vic. Correa alba var rotundifolia is endemic to the south east coast of Tasmania.







Plant Profile by Dave Handscombe

Correa alba is a very adaptable species that will grow in alkaline as well as acidic soils as long as they are well drained. It will grow in partial shade but will flower more profusely in full sun. It is frost hardy, drought tolerant and withstands salt spray making it useful for first line coastal planting. Flower colour is usually white but pink colour forms do exist, for example the cultivar Correa alba 'Western Pink Star' which was registered by members of the Warrnambool APS group.

Propagation is relatively easy from cuttings and there are many cultivars (although not officially registered) in the nursery trade.
