#### What Plant is This?

# Changes to the Membership and Constitution for Wimmera Growers of Australian Plants Inc.

WGAP has always operated as an affiliated group of Australian Plant Society Victoria. It has been brought to our attention that our club has not always operated within the rules of the affiliation meaning that some of our members, who do not belong to APS Vic, may not be covered by Public Liability Insurance.

At a WGAP committee meeting held on 22 June 2023, two options were discussed:

- 1. WGAP would need to purchase their own public liability to cover members who do not belong to APS Victoria. This would add considerable cost to the membership for WGAP and in particular those who are already members of APS Vic. They would be paying for the privilege of the cover of Public Liability twice. The committee felt that in some circumstances this would not be a fair option for all members.
- 2. That all members of WGAP would be required to become members of APS Vic. This would then mean that all our members would be covered for Public Liability and everyone would be paying the same membership fees which would probably be the cheaper option.

After some consideration the committee chose to go with Option 2. This will take time to for the changeover to take place. Steps to be taken for the changeover are:

- 1. The operating year for the WGAP constitution will need to be changed from a calendar year to a financial year that is from 1 July to the 30 June. This will then bring WGAP operating year in line with APS Vic.
- 2. The current WGAP constitution is out of date and requires several changes therefore the current Incorporations Victoria Model Rules have been downloaded and the committee is currently inserting the appropriate wording to suit our group.
- 3. For the new WGAP Constitution to be adopted by the club, a special general meeting will need to be called. The Christmas breakup is the proposed date for this meeting. Watch this space for further notice.
- 4. The committee moved that current memberships for WGAP will not expire until 30 June 2024 thus giving all WGAP members 18 months membership. This will then bring it in line with WGAP new constitution and APS Vic membership year. In future both memberships can be paid at the same time on the APS Vic Website.
- 5. Not all members have the facility to pay their membership online. This is where the Membership Officer will be able to assist and do this for you.

## Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria Cranbourne Gardens

Jill Burness, retired Landscape Planner for the Cranbourne Gardens gave us a brilliant presentation of *Introduction to the Australian Garden*. Thank you Jill for sharing with us.

The Australian Garden is located in the south-east urban growth corridor of Melbourne, in the City of Casey. It is 42 kilometres from the Melbourne Central Business District en route to Phillip Island, about 10 kilometres inland from Frankston.

The Garden consists of:

- 363 hectare site
- 19 hectare display garden
- 200,000 visitors/yr (+10% per yr)
- 50 plus Staff
- Active Friends Group
- A team of Volunteer Master Gardeners

The challenge in the 1990's was to convince people that native plants are attractive and suitable for home gardening.

The time line achieved for the gardens were:

1994 – Master Plan Design Brief

1995 - Landscape Master Plan adopted

2002 - State Government funding secured

2003 - Construction commenced for Stage 1

2006 – May 26th – Stage 1 opened to the public (12 years)

2007 – State Government funding secured for Stage 2

2009 - Revision of Landscape Master Plan

2010 - Construction commenced for Stage 2

2012 – June – Stage 2 opened to the public (5 years)

Before the garden commenced a nursery was built. The nursery brief was to source material from across Australia – seed, cuttings and plants for propagation.

The Melaleuca Spits was inspired by the waterways at the coast that have Melaleuca's growing to the water's edge. Eg. Tidal River at Wilsons Prom.

However any problems that they struck were overcome as the finished result is very pleasing to the eye of the many visitors.

## Excursion to Duffholme and Greening Australia Property at Nurcong

A very big thank you to Harvey Champness and Rae Decker who organised the day with such detail and thought.

We started the day off meeting at the Duffholme Memorial site. Harvey explained the history of the site with the information on the three children lost in the bush for nine days and how they survived. Many of us could remember our Grade 4 Reader with the story of *Lost in the Bush*.

We filled in the morning with a wonderful walk around the reserve and were in awe of so many wildflowers and orchids that were on show.

From the road, the site appears to be a eucalypt woodland with large areas of grass suitable for camping. How wrong one can be. This was a fine example of getting out of the vehicle and exploring.

Lunch was at the Mitre Hall and here we had Jess Gardner join us from Greening Australia. Jess has worked for Greening Australia for many years and is very passionate about her work. Jess lead us onto a Greening Australia property which originally had been grazed. Seed had to be collected and a large area was sown by direct seeding. With all the work Jess has done trying to eradicate rabbits many of the trees and shrubs were now starting to regenerate. It is truly a wonderful demonstration site which shows the community and visitors what can be done to assist a piece of land to return to its natural state.

From there Jess led us to the natural bush area explaining to us how much of it had returned since the sheep and rabbits had been excluded from the site.

Thank you Jess for giving up your time to show us around and tell us about all the wonderul work you have done and are continuing to do.
