Treasurer's Report – Sue Gwilym APS Vic Online Memberships and Fee Increases

APS Vic has been working on an online membership system for quite some time and it looks like it will be in place for 1st July renewals. Online membership renewals using payment by debit/credit card have been successfully trialled. Payment by card completes the renewal in one step, will reduce the work for the Membership Officer and is the preferred method. You will also be able to pay using Eftpos, but members who are unable to use the online system will still be able to pay by previous methods too (bank deposit, cheque, etc.).

At the November 2022 Committee of Management Meeting of APS Vic, it was decided to increase membership fees in all categories. APS Vic has not increased fees for several years, but rising costs have meant that a small increase is needed to cover costs. Currently single membership is \$35.00, and households pay \$40.00, which will increase to \$38.00 for a single, and \$44.00 for a household. Student membership will increase from \$26.00 to \$28.00. The subscription cost for Australian Plants magazine will rise from \$15.00 to \$20.00. Membership of APS Yarra Yarra will not increase and will remain at \$12.00.

General Meeting Thursday 1st June 2023

John Lenagan – Habitats for Nature, Supporting Those Essential Symbiotic Relationships



John is a retired Architect, who has always had a keen interest in nature and the ever present but often hidden symbiotic relationships within healthy ecosystems.

Since retiring John has explored many equatorial rainforest habitats including the Amazon Basin in Brazil, Venezuela, Columbia and Ecuador, he has also carried out field trips jungles of Sabah, the West Papua, Madagascar and of course, the York Peninsula Queensland. As a conservation photographer he recorded basically anything and everything that moved or could wink at him. Through these immersed encounters he realised that within each and every one of these amazing environments all of its nature was a tightly woven web of symbiotic relations, each dependent on each other.

Since moving down to Anglesea 8 years ago with a house adjacent to the Otway ranges, John has been recording the local wildlife adjacent to and on their quarter acre plot and developing ways to naturally enhance the habitat of the property to support and attract the rich diversity of native wildlife.

His presentation while visually rich with detailed images and anecdotes of the many characters that he has encountered on the property, does not attempt to be scientific in its findings but more importantly attempts to celebrate the wonder of the many elements and animals that make up a healthy native habitat.

Past Speaker Reports

Report on talk by Miriam Ford about ANPSA (Australian Native Plants Society Australia) 2/4/2023. Report by Cathy Mann

Wondering what ANPSA is? Well if you came to our last meeting you would now be wellinformed thanks to our speaker Miriam Ford.

ANPSA is an association of all the state and territory native plant societies, such as APS Victoria (our state branch).

They do lots of things including running study groups, publications, supporting research, festivals, conferences, seminars and encouraging interest in and cultivation of, Australian native plants. Their website is a treasure trove of information on our native plants. It's worth checking out, especially the native plant profiles which give you extensive growing and propagating information with great photos for ID: https://anpsa.org.au/

But Miriam's main focus was on the biennial conferences held by ANPSA every 2 years. They are held by different states and territories on a rotating basis and 2024 will be Victoria's turn.

Miriam has been to a number of these conferences and highly recommends them – for the garden tours, pre- and post-tours further afield and of course the information you will glean and the camaraderie of likeminded people.

The seminars involve talks by expert speakers interspersed with field trips. Each conference has a different theme.

We enjoyed the presentation Miriam gave of the Conference in 2019 in Albany, Western Australia with plenty of wonderful photos and a commentary by Miriam.

Miriam also attended the 2022 conference in Kiama NSW, which had the theme of Past, Present and Future. Our friend Costa gave the AJ Swaby address and a stage full of young people contributed, in keeping with the Future

part of the theme. And of course there were enjoyable field trips and pre- and post- tours to be had.

Report on Neil Duncan's talk: Flora of the Pillaga National Park and other Parks near Sydney 6/4/2023. Report by Cathy Mann

Neil is a member of the Keilor Plains APS group and had wanted to visit the Pillaga for a while, so he was very pleased when it was one of the tours offered with the ANPSA conference last year.

The Pillaga National Park is in northern NSW, between Coonabarabran and Narrabri, the closest town being Baradine. It's generally flat and wooded country with amazing sandstone caves (like honeycomb), which were used extensively by the local indigenous people. Their botanist guide, David Clark, (who sometimes writes articles about plants and geology in Australian Plants) showed the group a multitude of native plants including Acacias, Boronias, Orchids, Cryptandra, Dampieras, Hardenbergias, Styphelias and Phebaliums. Neil showed us some wonderful photos of these plants.

A lot of the tracks were closed due to heavy rains in the area but, if they couldn't get to a certain place, another of interest would be found nearby, one of which was a cut flower and nursery business with large gardens, which they spent a while exploring.

They also explored the Sawn Rocks Organ Pipes in Mt Kaputar National Park near Narrabri. Neil is also a member of the Friends of Organ Pipes National Park in Victoria. These structures are formed by cooling magma into hexagonal basalt pipes.

Back then to Kiama and the conference. The field trips from there took them to the University of Sydney Research Farm where one of the researchers is trialling native grasses to use as crops for bread.

The Royal National Park just south of Sydney was a highlight with cabbage palms and many walking tracks; also the Illawarra Grevillea Botanical Garden at the edge of the rainforest near Wollongong.

They also visited Boongala Native Gardens which is 11 hectares of recreated rainforest and gardens in Kenthurst near Sydney.

Kuringai National Park is north of Sydney and contained a wealth of flannel flowers (with lots of insects in them), waratahs, rock orchids and banksias. On the other side of the bay was North Head with its beautiful Angophoras growing on the sandstone. The old Quarantine Cemetery nearby was also a wonderland of wildflowers especially flannel flowers.

Past Garden Visit Reports

La Trobe Uni (Nangak Tamboree) Wildlife Sanctuary 31/3/2023 Report by Peter Smith

Unfortunately poor weather and several late cancellations saw only three of us greeted by two keen young guides.

They gave us a brief background to this now revived bio-diverse waterway connecting the Gresswell Habitat Link in the north through LaTrobe's Bundoora Campus to Darebin Creek in the south. Most of the 30 hectare area of River Red Gum Grassy woodlands had initially been cleared for grazing, and cleared further for recreational activity connected to the former Mont Park Psychiatric institution.

Setting off into the drizzle, it wasn't long before we were confronted by a tiny frog on the pathway. We continued cautiously, but our attention was soon focused on the treetops where both the Brushtail and Ringtail possums were moving about. Then...Whizoo...a glider (Sugar or Feather tailed...not sure), but fascinating to watch it making its way up higher, to perhaps launch again.

Before long we were at Main Lake, hearing about the problems posed to our native fish populations and waterways by the introduced mosquito fish (Gambusia holbrooki). Another frog, an Eastern dwarf tree frog, this one spotted while looking at the marvellous glistening webs of the leaf curling spiders.

Onwards we moved, hearing about the preference of our frogs for the ephemeral and natural wetlands over the man-made habitat, the chorus growing louder as we approached these areas. Further on the story of the goat...? sorry can't give away everything! Some active Yarra Yarra participation as we recognised a few of the local plants and listened in on the importance of retaining the older trees (including non-indigenous) in the hope of getting good hollows. The associated

importance of providing nesting boxes...the abandoned old Holden station wagon, another story for another day...a bit further on the Galaxiella Billabong, not manmade and free from the ubiquitous "noxious" Gambusia, and home to native Galaxiids. Our guides had been building up our hopes of seeing some resident Tawny Frogmouths, but no, what we first thought was a Tawny sitting not far from the track, came in closer to show us that "they" is indeed a Southern Boobook. A wonderful ending to a wonderful night out and about.

Ann and Tom Cox Garden Visit, Lower Plenty on 5/3/2023. Report by Peter Smith

A surprisingly large group turned up on this hot March afternoon to see what long-time members Ann and Tom Cox had created over some fifty years or so on their hard hillside in Lower Plenty.

The shapely trunks of local eucalypts framed the pathway, and their canopies shaded us as we gathered on the paved verandah. Tom and Ann told some of the stories of clearing the weeds, building their mud brick home, creating a garden, acquiring the next door block, creating more garden, all whilst raising their young family.

Back then a creek and gully ran at the bottom of the hill local kids hung out. Not having much success growing from cuttings, Ann grew plants from seed. The priority was to screen the inevitable development, and even back

then, they could foresee "climate change" and they chose "plants which could tolerate dry conditions - lots of eremophilas, acacias, correas, mallees and hakeas".

As we split up to look around and take it all in, a large spreading "Moonah" (Melaleuca lanceolata) impressed us all, as well as attracting numerous bees, butterflies and other insects with its white flowers. Local wattles and a developing Acacia covenyi were doing the job of screening. Westringias, Prostantheras were also surviving well. We recognised some of the plants picked up from their trips further afield (Arid Lands Gardens Nursery) as well as some from people within the group. Geijera parviflora, Pittosporum angustifolium, P. phylliraeoides, Callitris and Allocasuarina...some of Noel's eremophilas, and Ann's favourite, the small leaf blue bush (Mariana brevifolia), familiar to those who have journeyed inland.

Much to take in...and as a cuppa beckoned... and much chatting ensued...not enough time to take in the garden up top. Thank you Ann and Tom for a lovely relaxed Sunday afternoon

Rotary Community Tree Planting -Queen's Jubilee Project along the Diamond Creek

You are invited to join us in partnering with Rotary Club of Eltham and other community groups to plant 1040 trees to target canopy loss, habitat loss and breaks in the wildlife corridor along the Diamond Creek between Wattletree Road and Allendale Road.

The project was officially launched on 14th October 2022 with the planting of ceremonial trees; however the main plantings were deferred to Autumn this year to minimise plant loss over the Summer period.

Would you like your soil tested?

For all you vegie growers out there, the EPA has a new citizen science program called GardenSafe where they will test your garden soil for 8 contaminants including lead. They will also look at the quality of the soil and send you a report detailing the results. All you do is register on their website and send in 3 soil samples. Data will be collated to assist in understanding potential contamination levels in residential areas of Victoria. It will not be used for any other purpose.

New and Emerging Weed - Aaron's Beard Hypericum calycinum

The following information is from Nillumbik Environment and Sustainability E-News March 2023

In December 2022 Council officers noted a weed unfamiliar to them in Christmas Hills growing along Skyline Road. Aaron's Beard *Hypericum calycinum* is an extensively creeping, rhizomatous subshrub to 40 cm high. The flowers are solitary yellow in colour and approximately 5cm across.

The species hasn't been recorded outside of gardens before in Nillumbik and has the potential to spread further. It is related to other *Hypericum* species such as St Johns Wort and Tutsan, both more common weeds in the shire. There are also native St Johns Worts', which are generally smaller than the introduced ones.

Council is actively managing the weed on roadsides but it also appears to be spreading into adjacent private property. If you suspect you have this species on your property or would like help in identification of weeds. You can contact Council's environment team — environment@nillumbik.vic.gov.au
