I am currently working on the exciting 'Care for the Rare' project collecting some of Victoria's rare and threatened seed or plant material for propagation at the RBGV Cranbourne. Once the plants are grown, they will be delivered to Botanic Gardens already participating in the project.

The Australian Gardens in Shepparton, Colac and Dandenong Ranges Botanic Gardens were the first to join, and now we welcome <u>Ballarat Botanical Gardens</u> and Sale Botanic Gardens to the Care for the Rare project. These Botanic gardens will eventually house their own collection of some of Victoria's rare and threatened flora endemic to each of their regions. It's a wonderful way to not only strengthen connections with regional botanic gardens within the state, but to also create greater public awareness of our beautiful rare and threatened flora.

I have exhausted our living collections here at Cranbourne and the RBGV Melbourne, and also the Seedbank at the Melbourne Herbarium. Many of the plants are quite obscure and I am seeking your expertise in the hopes of securing more species from our list. Do you know of the locations of wild populations or anyone who may be cultivating some of the species on the attached list? I would greatly appreciate key contacts to liaise with if you know of anyone who may be able to help. I look forward to hearing from you when your time permits. (See list on page 5.)

The Murnong SEED Citizen Science Project is up and running. This is an exciting project for those of us who are interested in native vegetation and the fascinating little Murnong daisy in particular.

We are looking for home gardeners, community groups and schools to join the Citizen Science Team helping Federation University researchers investigate the Murnong story around Ballarat. Together we'll explore the growth and distribution of the two local species, analyse their nutritional and medicinal value and build up stocks for education and revegetation projects.

If you are not located 'around Ballarat' (a one-hour drive) but still interested in the project, there is an option to sign-up to the project mailing list to receive updates. We are hoping that in future years we may be able to expand the project to a geographically wider region.

Correa (several) including: 'Dusky Bells', 'Ice Maiden' ('Pink Mist' x Correa Alba), one with very-white bells with a touch of pink at the base, another with off-white bells has been flowering for months and the flowers on 21 June were looking a little tired. A beautiful surprise for me was a correa that has flowered for its first time, it has greenish/yellowing bells, almost iridescent (photo above). Jean Arnott suggests it is Correa glabra. Eremophila 'Magic Blush', Eremophila nivea x christophorii, Eremophila nivea, Grevillea 'Peaches and Cream', Hardenbergia violacea, Thrytomene (possibly hyorhytis variety), Prostanthera sp.
