40th Pomonal Native Flower Show

Pomonal Native Flower Show – 40th Anniversary 21st and 22nd September 2024

Not long to go!!!

Clarence Slockee, from ABC's Gardening Australia is presenting on both days at 12pm. He will demonstrate how to grow Bush foods in containers and speak about his top 10 edible plants. We also have ABC Gardening Australia filming of show preparation and the Saturday.

The event will be formally opened by Clarence along with recognising the 40 year celebration at 10:00 am on the Saturday in the marquee. Members present at 10am will be terrific.

Neil Marriott will talk at 10:30am both days on 'WAMA and plants endemic to the Grampians' with a focus on the edible plants that are growing there.

At 2pm each day **Julie Weatherhead** from **Peppermint Ridge farm** in Tynong north who along with Anthony Hooper have been growing and cultivating a wide range of Australian native bush food and botanical plants for over twenty five years. She is selling her book **'Australian Native Food Harvest'** which references nutritional analysis of the different plants, gives ideas on planting a native food garden and provides excellent easy recipes to try at home. Peppermint Ridge will have a stall set up for the duration of the weekend, to sell the book, plants and food items made from their farm's bush foods.

Pomonal primary school will have an amazing display of their work on 'The recovery of the local bush after the bushfire'

We will also have a historical display of photos taken over the last 40 years of the show

We are hoping to have most flowers picked on Thursday afternoon ready for a 10am start on Friday to bring them in, place them in vases and put them out on the tables with their labels. Everyone who is free on Friday is most welcome to help out as this takes quite a while.

We will put the marquee up either Wednesday afternoon or Thursday morning but will decide this at the next meeting on the 17th Sept when we know what the weather is going to be.

Anyone who has a bush foods plant in a pot and is willing to lend it for the weekend please bring it to this coming meeting so we can label it and have it ready as we set up. It will be cared for and returned to you after the show.

If you have spare native flowers in your garden please bring them in on the Friday 20th as Fiona's flower stall will need lots.

Hope you can all make it to the meeting on the 17th where we will be going over last minute details

APS Grampians South Australia Trip Sept 2024 Neil Marriott

Following discussions between John King, Marie Goods and Dave and Linda Handscombe after Dean Nicolle's wonderful weekend at our last year's flower show, it was agreed to organise a combined trip with the Wimmera APS Group, Warrnambool APS Group and the Grampians APS Group. 2 members from Hamilton also joined in. The central feature of the weekend was to be the visit to Dean Nicolle's Currency Creek Arboretum on the Sunday morning, with other gardens and bushland areas for the Saturday and Monday.

Most members arrived on the Friday night and Anthea Nicholls, John and Jocelyn King and I caught up with fellow members Maryanne Jess and friend Deb at the local Middleton Tavern for a lovely dinner.

Before dinner we went for a walk along the Middleton beach and were amazed to see how much damage had been done by


the violent storms the week before. But even more amazing were the tens of thousands of strange furry balls strewn all along the beach. An investigation of these with Mr Google revealed that they are known as Sea Balls! They are made up of tightly packed fibrous marine material, normally the remains of sea-grass stems!! Amazing!!

The next morning we met at the Baghurst garden high up in the hills above Middleton Beach where Judy and Andrew Baghurst have developed a most beautiful garden, full of native treasures and with the most wonderful views over the coastline. We were all amazed to see how *Eremophila biserrata* had been most successfully used as a green mulch throughout many of the gardens. The sculptured plants, kept low by the prevailing winds, were just beautiful.

After the Baghurst Garden we travelled on to the Lower Inman Valley where we visited Pat and Gerald Uphills'

Valley. Here we were guided around the extensive native gardens, all maintained by local volunteers.

There were many plants in flower, but one that caught all our attention was the superb large *Doryanthes* palmeri Spear Lily from the Border Ranges on the NSW-Qld border.

beautiful garden set amongst the most delightful local gum trees you could ever get!! There was a good range of species, with Pink Gum Eucalyptus fasciculosa being slightly more dominant than the Yellow Gum Eucalyptus leucoxylon. We were slightly amused that the South Australians call our Yellow Gum the Blue Gum!! Not sure what was blue about them, but doesn't it show how stupid common names can be!!

Next on the agenda was a visit to the wonderful public garden Nangawooka in the Hindmarsh

The final destination for the day was to the lovely remnant area of local Goolwa bushland where local young naturalist Malcolm Worthing showed us around an area that would have become yet more houses and asphalt if not for the local council buying it and preserving it!!

The area contains many rare and endangered local plant species as well as lots of wildlife. A feature was spectacular local grasstrees *Xanthorrhoea* semiplana, a very rare plant in the western Grampians, but common here. We also saw the beautiful, but rare Butterfly Spyridium *Spyridium coactilifolium* which would make a most beautiful garden plant.

The following morning we all met at Currency Creek Arboretum and were greeted by Dean Nicolle and his lovely partner Annett. We were taken on a wonderful and most educational tour of just some of the highlights of the arboretum –the world's largest living collection of Eucalypts! Dean plants a large block of species every

year, with three plants for every species being planted. The first trees went in in 1992 and planting continues to this day, with much scientific research being carried out with the developing trees.
