- two pencils, an H or 2H,
- a small ruler marked in centimetres,
- a flower or sprig of leaves from your garden
- a small vase or jam jar in which to place your flower.

If you don't have a suitable flower from your garden, there will be flowers on the display table.

Drawing paper & erasers will be provided, as well as extra pencils & rulers for those who cannot bring their own.

For those who prefer to browse John's many books on botanical art, there will plenty to keep you enthralled with the delights of illustrators from centuries past to the present.

REPORT - GARDEN VISIT TO ALEX AND KERSTY TRAILL'S GARDEN

ON SUNDAY MAY 28TH



Despite the grey and drizzly weather, a curious and enthusiastic band of Wang APS stalwarts donned raincoats and unfurled their umbrellas in anticipation of enjoying the delightful garden of Alex and Kersty Trail.



A major challenge for establishing an ornamental garden, together with an orchard

and veggie beds has been the Wangaratta floodplain curse --ubiquitous clay.



The property backs onto the Ovens River. The house pad has been built up to above flood level, but the back area, including the veggie beds can be inundated in wet weather. Notwithstanding these challenges, Kersty and Alex have established a delightful garden, and through trial and error are continuing to refine the species which will thrive in these challenging conditions. The veggie garden has raised beds

with heaps of organic material yielding good results. All garden areas are regularly and heavily mulched. Kersty had major input into planning the passive solar house. Large windows outlook the garden, and wide verandahs are draped with ornamental grapevines. The garden surrounding the house is relatively well-drained and is developing well. So well, in fact, that the broadleaved form of *Myoporum parvifolium* [Creeping Boobialla] has become so successfully established that Kersty and Alex had stripped a trailer-full of excess growth the previous week to make space for other precious plantings.



After the garden tour, our group of 12 APS visitors left their umbrellas and raincoats to dry and enjoyed a happy social time around the kitchen table.

Our thanks to Kersty and Alex for offering to host the

CHANGES TO MEMBERSHIP RENEWALS

APS Victoria is introducing online handling of 2023/2024 renewals and new memberships. Membership applications and renewals fall due on 1st July of each year.

Unless your membership renewal is received by 31st October, it will lapse.

Most members with an email address will login to https://apsvic.org.au/membership/.

Your membership name needs to be the same as on your address label of the envelope

you receive the Growing Australian Magazine in. Please ensure that if you are a family membership, that you include all names on the address label. The envelope also has your membership number. DON'T THROW IT AWAY! The membership number is your log-in code.

Choose your subscription type [Single, Household, Student], update your details as necessary, choose the method of payment and submit. This is a secure website.



If you pay by card (the preferred method), your membership will be immediately renewed; if by another method, your membership renewal will be confirmed once the deposited amount has been reconciled.

The district group portion of the payment will be transferred monthly to each District Group. If you do not have internet access, membership renewals and registration of new members will be facilitated by our Membership Officer, Gillian Anderson. Our District Group will no longer provide separate Membership renewal forms.

There are two separate components to the annual membership fees. These are Australian Plants Society Victoria, and Wangaratta Australian Plants Society District Group.

There is a third optional component to receive the National Plants Magazine "Australian Plants".

The annual membership fees for the Wangaratta District Group component are Single \$12, Household \$14, Student \$10.

The Australian Plants Victoria membership component from July 2023 will be Single \$38, Household \$44, Student \$28.

This includes the quarterly magazine "Growing Australian".

The optional additional subscription to receive the national magazine "Australian Plants" is \$20.

RARE FLOODS IN SEMI-ARID VICTORIA HAVE LED TO THE DISCOVERY OF A PREVIOUSLY UNRECORDED PLANT SPECIES, THE WIRE-STEM CHICKWEED, ON DRYING WETLANDS IN THE MALLEE.

The wire-stem chickweed grows in arid areas including Central Australia, but experts say even there it is uncommon.

The discovery was made on Fiona and Phil Murdoch's 490-hectare conservation property next to Hattah-Kulkyne National Park.

Ms Murdoch, who does conservation work on the property, said the historical discovery was only possible due to Raakajlim Creek at their property in Colignan getting soaked for the first time in 50 years during summer water events.

"We've been monitoring how the vegetation has been recovering since the floods that went through our property from the Murray River in December 2022 and the landscape is changing really quickly.



"I was walking along in pretty much a bare area and there's this really strange plant with a red stem so I had a bit of a look and couldn't find it in any of my plant books. "I sent it to some friends and they had no idea [and said] 'never seen that one'. "So I looked into more plant books and eventually sent it down to the [National] Herbarium of Victoria who confirmed the identification of wire stem chickweed.

Ms Murdoch described the less than 10-centimetre tall plant as "quite unassuming" with a red stem surrounded by a small rosette of leaves and tiny white flowers "that look like they're never going to open".



"It spreads out and looks like a little red sprinkling across the ground," she said. "One of the awesome things about living in the Mallee is it's still possible to discover things because not everywhere in the valley has been explored. "I always think being out in the bush is a bit like a treasure hunt. You never know what you're going to find."

"It's super exciting particularly after a big flood because it makes you ask what other species are out there hanging on in very small numbers or, like this, never discovered in Victoria before.

WIRADJURI AND WALGALU WOMEN PROTECT ENDANGERED TUMUT GREVILLEA PLANT AS PART OF BUUGANG WAMBAL PROJECT

Megan Considine is a Wiradjuri-Walgalu woman and a coordinator of the Buugang Wambal Conservation & Connecting to Country Project. The project is one of nine in NSW funded by the Department of Planning and Environment that is studying how ecosystems can be improved when



Aboriginal people are involved in looking after traditional lands.

Buugang Wambal refers to the Bogong Moth Mountain in Wiradjuri language; one site the project has focused conservation efforts on.

But on the banks of the Tumut River, the critically endangered Tumut grevillea takes centre stage. It almost exclusively occurs in a 6 kilometre corridor in the state's south-west. The project focuses on land management and Aboriginal women are laying the groundwork by planting seedlings. The project also aims to get the Aboriginal people back onto country to care for this endangered grevillea.

Senior threatened species officer with the NSW Department of Planning and Environment, David Hunter, works alongside the community as part of the project. The Tumut grevillea has long been associated with women's business. Dr Hunter said the approach being taken through Buugang Wambal was the way of the future.

"We're out on country looking after species in places that are culturally very significant to the Brungle-Tumut community, so we have a real role to play in facilitating access for community to get back on country," he said. "We're [also] learning a whole new thing about these



species and the possible traditional management

tools that could be used to look after them."

Local men have been involved in conservation of the endangered corroboree frog, but the grevillea project is where the women gather. That is in keeping with longstanding cultural practice, according to Jasmyn Penrith, a

Wiradjuri woman from Tumut.

"The grevillea is usually connected to women's business because we've found it around a lot of women's sites, it's really significant," she said.

For Jamie Freeman, working with the grevillea is about continuity. "It's meaningful, we know that in the future they're going to grow, they're going to be here for our kids and that makes you feel better," she said.

Ms Considine is one of two community coordinators employed on the project, which

comprises almost 40 Walgalu and Wiradjuri people. But Dr Hunter said the funding for those roles was due to run out within eight months.

"We see this as a project that needs to be ongoing, this needs to be how we do business in biodiversity conservation," he said. "We need to be moving forward with the traditional owners and doing everything in collaboration, and



supporting the traditional owners to be on country."

Projects such as Buugang Wambal would be considered in a new Healthy Country Framework being developed by the Department of Planning and Environment, which would identify caring for country projects with which the community could be engaged.
