Dillwynia sericea found throughout south-eastern Australia from South Australia to northern NSW and Tasmania.

It will grow to 0.6-1.3m high with fine leaves, with or without long hairs. Yellow or red and orange, flowers are produced from August to December.

It prefers moist to dry soils in full sun or semi-shade, is frost tolerant, is suitable for containers and responds to pruning.

Hop Bitter-pea is a most floriferous open to dense shrub 1-3 m high and 1-2 m wide. It has large, wavy grey-green leaves and masses of small yellow and maroon flowers in spring. It grows in a surprisingly broad range of habitats from the wet mountains of the

Eastern Highlands to lower forests, swampy woodlands to the grasslands. It is found down the east coast from Qld to Tasmania.

In the garden it can be grown in most soils, even coping with wetter winter/spring soils and hot dry summer conditions. A real bonus! It can be used to screen an area, especially when several planted together, or it can be pruned to form a hedge.
